

DESCRIPTION OF THE DISTRICT

Diller-Odell Public Schools is a consolidated district organized on April 2, 2000. The Diller and Odell communities are twelve miles apart and the district covers approximately 170 square miles in southern Gage and Jefferson Counties. Community members are dedicated to a quality education for their children. Twice patrons approved a levy override. Nearly 75% of receipts come from local taxes, and nearly 70% of the budget is appropriated for instructional use.



Diller-Odell Public Schools continues to have a low mill levy, while operating a fiscally responsible budget with little state aid. The Diller-Odell Public Schools tax requirement for the 2022-2023 school year was \$4,719,494. The 2022 valuation of \$599,579,338 increased \$2,159,856 over the 2021 valuation of \$597,419,482.







PIONEER CONFERENCE LEVY COMPARISON









NEBRASKA STUDENT-CENTERED ASSESSMENT SYSTEM (NSCAS)

The Nebraska Student-Centered Assessment System (NSCAS) is the new statewide assessment system, which follows Nebraska's initiatives to prepare students for success in postsecondary education, career and civic life. NSCAS General assessments are given in English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics annually in grades 3-8 and in Science annually in grades 5 and 8. All third year cohort students (typically juniors) at Diller-Odell take the ACT.




